On the night of the party, Mary picked us up at our hotel ("us" meaning my friend Maizie Hale, who was joining me for a week), and we were whisked away to a grand old Paris apartment with lofty ceilings and huge roaring fireplaces. It had turned a bit chilly, but Mary insisted that we go out on the balcony to pour the champagne- and was it worth it! We drank a toast to the Arc de Triomphe... We also got to preview the George and Barbara Bush portrait, which the Bushes used as their Christmas card. It is scheduled to hang in the George Bush Library in Texas A & M University.

On our last day in Paris, a friend of Mary's drove us all around the outskirts of Paris, Versailles, Malmaison, St. Cloud and St. Germain-en-Laye, and gave us a running commentary on French history.
